I wonder if you can let me have some information for inclusion in the forthcoming revision of the Health Reference Book. The 1946 Health Reference Book contained on page 52 the statement; "Indian and Eskimo patients are also treated in provincial institutions at the expense of the Dominion government. In 1945 there were 194 such patients given 55,600 days' care in 22 mental hospitals." It is intended to include similar information in the new edition. Can you give me for 1947, if possible, or if that is not available then for 1946, the number of Indian and Eskimo patients in provincial mental hospitals, the number of mental hospitals in which these patients were, and the number of patient days spent by Indians and Eskimos in such hospitals during the year. If the last of these items would mean considerable work to calculate, it might readily be omitted.

Re: Juvenile Delinquents

There is an ever increasing need for pyschiatrists and sociologists to study the history of and to advise on the treatment, care and education of Indian children, who for some reason cannot be properly adjusted to our present school set-up.

There are no reform schools in this province and therefore no place for the incorrigibles. The charitable institutions are overtaxed and it is difficult to even get into them. They are poor substitutes at best for what is required. Qualified sociologists and pyschiatrists would study the cause of the unbalanced mental and physical condition in early life when it would be possible to correct it.

It would be our recommendation that, before recommending the establishment of reform schools for Indian children, that trained sociologists be added to our school section and qualified pyschiatrists to the Indian Health Services Branch of the Department of Health & Welfare.

Problem cases with no solution have instigated

this letter.
